1 2510 INSTRUCTION

- 2 School Wellness
- 3 The Great Falls School District is committed to providing a school environment that promotes and protects
- 4 students' health, well-being, and ability to learn. The District fosters healthy eating and physical activity.
- 5 Therefore, it is the policy of the District that:

6 Nutrition Education

- 7 The District shall offer nutrition education that teaches the knowledge and skills needed to adopt healthy
- 8 eating behaviors and that take into consideration Montana's Health Enhancement Content Standards and
- 9 Benchmarks. Nutrition education shall be integrated into the curriculum. Nutrition information and
- education shall be offered throughout the school campus and based on the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for
- 11 Americans. Staff who provide nutrition education shall have the appropriate training, such as in health
- 12 enhancement or family and consumer sciences.

13 Health Enhancement and Physical Activity Opportunities

- 14 The District shall offer health enhancement opportunities that include the components of a quality health
- enhancement program taught by certified health enhancement specialists. Health enhancement shall
- equip students with the knowledge, skills, and habits necessary for lifelong physical activity. Health
- 17 enhancement instruction is based on the Montana's Health Enhancement Content Standards and
- 18 Benchmarks.
- All K-12 students of the District shall have the opportunity to participate regularly in physical activities, to
- 20 maintain physical fitness, and to understand the benefits of a physically active and healthy lifestyle.

21 <u>Nutrition Standards in School Meals</u>

- The District shall ensure that reimbursable school meals meet the program requirements and nutrition
- 23 standards found in federal regulations. The District shall encourage students to make nutritious food
- choices through accessibility and marketing efforts of healthful foods.

25 Competitive Foods and Beverages in Schools

- The District shall ensure all foods and beverages available on each school campus under the local
- education agency during the school day, meet the USDA Smart Snacks in School nutrition standards.
- "School day" is defined as the time between midnight the night before to thirty minutes after the end of
- the official school day. "School Campus" is defined as all areas of the property under the jurisdiction of
- the school that are accessible to students during the school day. The District shall monitor all food and
- 31 beverages sold or served to students, including those available outside the federally regulated child
- nutrition programs (i.e., ala carte, vending, student stores, classroom rewards, fundraising efforts). The
- District shall consider nutrient density and portion size before permitting food and beverages to be sold
- or served to students. The Superintendent or designee shall evaluate vending policies and contracts.
- Vending contracts that do not meet the intent and purpose of this policy shall be modified accordingly or
- 35 Vending contracts that do not meet the intent and purpose of this policy shall be modified accordingly of
- not renewed. Community partners will comply with the District's school wellness policy when providing
- services to students during school hours. "School campus" is defined as all areas of the property under
- the jurisdiction of the school that are accessible to students during the school day.

39 Other School-Based Activities Designed to Promote Student-Wellness

- The District may implement other appropriate programs that help create a school environment that
- 41 conveys consistent wellness messages and are conducive to healthy eating and physical activity, such as

- staff wellness programs, non-food reward systems and fundraising efforts. The District will foster
- 2 relationships with community partners in support of this wellness policy's implementation.
- 3 Policy, Monitoring and Implementation
- 4 The District will convene a district wellness committee that meets to establish goals for and oversee school
- 5 health and wellness policies, procedures and programs, including development, implementation, and
- 6 periodic review and updates. The wellness committee membership will represent all school levels and
- 7 include but not be limited to: parents, guardians, students, school foodservices, health enhancement
- 8 teachers, school health professionals, the public, school board and school administrators. The wellness
- 9 policy, committee roster, meeting minutes and triennial assessments and reports can be found on the
- 10 District website.
- The appointed District Wellness Coordinator will ensure that the District retains records to demonstrate
- compliance with this Policy. The requirements of the applicable federal regulations, including the
- 13 Fundraising Food and Beverages Approval forms documentation of promotional activities must be
- 14 accessible and located at each school building and with the District Wellness Coordinator for the
- 15 Administrative Review by the Office of Public Instruction.
- 16 Before any changes are made to approve vending machine products, the proposed new items must go
- 17 through the appointed District Wellness Coordinator. The Wellness Coordinator will keep a list of
- 18 approved items on file.
- 19 Each school's principal or designee is charged with the operational responsibility for ensuring that each
- school fulfills the District's local wellness policy for measuring implementation of the local wellness policy.
- 21 As necessary, the Superintendent shall develop and implement administrative regulations consistent with
- this policy. Input from teachers, school staff, parents and the public shall be solicited before implementing
- 23 such rules. The Superintendent shall monitor how well this policy is being implemented, managed, and
- enforced. The Superintendent shall report to the Board, as requested, on the District's programs and
- efforts to meet the purpose and intent of this policy.
- 26 Responsibility for Implementation
- 27 The Superintendent is responsible for the implementation of this policy.
